I attended Interfaith Glasgow's World Interfaith Harmony Week event exploring scriptural motivations for interfaith dialogue from Christian, Muslim, and Jewish perspectives and was very impressed by the thought that had gone into the preparation of the event and the depth of the dialogue that took place.

I have been to many dialogues in my time but this one reached a level of honesty and engagement that is not always possible during interfaith events. The participants were so at home with one another that they were able to ask honest questions which dispelled some misunderstandings. For example someone wanted to clarify for themselves that the Good Samaritan was a story – with a meaning – but not an account of an historical event; someone felt free to ask how a Christian could respond to the Jewish scripture that stated God is one which led to an in depth discussion not only about our understanding of God but about our responses of commitment and devotion to the reality of God in our lives. For me this was an example of harmony, of union of mind and soul based on our common belief in God.

I have been involved in interfaith encounter for many years at local, national and international level and I am impressed by the work of Interfaith Glasgow. This scriptural reasoning experience along with the two other events in Interfaith Glasgow's World Interfaith Harmony Week programme (which explored other crucial aspects of interfaith harmony), was an excellent contribution to the promotion of interfaith harmony and an example of good practice from which many could learn and which will benefit not only our nation but promote peace in our world.
