It is a privilege for me to write a reference on behalf of a long-time colleague Ms. Shaheen Akhtar. I have known Shaheen since the mid-90's when she served as a teacher at the Islamic Center in Boston (Wayland) at which I had been President on three different occasions. Over this period of interaction I have had an excellent opportunity to gauge Shaheen's unconditional commitment to the many responsibilities, in addition to teaching, that she took on or self-initiated. She was both self-driven and a team player.

In her role as a teacher she focused not only on ensuring that her children were given a sound grounding in Islamic studies, but also reinforced the notion of how to engage with peers of different religious backgrounds with respect and mutual understanding in our pluralistic society.

While engaged as a formal educator, Shaheen, also made time to pursue her passion in promoting inter-religious harmony.
