# UN World Interfaith Harmony Week at KPU

4th Annual

February 4; 6-8, 2018

#### Overview

Kwantlen Polytechnic University (KPU) marked its fourth annual celebration of the United Nations World Interfaith Harmony Week from February 6-8, 2018, led by the KPU Multi-Faith Centre.

This year's theme - Paths to Peace - was a call to share experiences or personal narratives on how we make our way toward Interfaith Harmony. Submissions took the form of poetry, art, music, and other creative expressions, and were exhibited over the week at KPU's Richmond, B.C. and Surrey, B.C. campuses. These expressions were punctuated by a series of community engagement events, including:

- Feb. 6: Pancakes for Peace
- Feb 7: Brown Bag and Beliefs Israel and Palestine: Listening, Respect, and Dialogue toward Peace and Reconciliation
- Feb 8: Indonesian Gamelan Performance
- Feb 8: Closing ceremony

#### **Events**

In addition to these campus activities, KPU partnered with the Surrey, B.C. Interfaith Council to co-host a 16-kilometre interfaith pilgrimage across the city on February 4. The pilgrimage led some two-dozen individuals from varying walks of life across the city, stopping along the way to pay respects at a number of sacred centres, including:

- Thien Ton Buddhist Temple
- Laxmi Narayana Hindu Mandir
- Surrey Jamea Muslim Masjid
- Guru Nanak Sikh Gurdwara

Following the pilgrimage, events at KPU kicked off with our inaugural presentation of Pancakes for Peace at the Richmond campus. This event saw over a dozen invited community faith leaders on campus for a free, open-floor pancake breakfast encouraging face-to-face dialogue between students, staff, faculty, and faith leaders. Faith leaders presented introductions on the initiatives their organizations were leading to further interfaith harmony across the community, followed by opportunities for attendees to mingle and chat one-on-one over a warm breakfast. This demonstration of respectful dialogue set the tone for the rest of the week.

The week progressed with a special presentation of the Multi-Faith Centre's "Brown Bag and Beliefs" speaker series on session Israel and Palestine: Listening, Respect, and Dialogue toward Peace and Reconciliation. This highly-engaging session was co-presented by Jennifer Roosma, one of KPU's Multi-Faith Centre chaplains and a member of the Tapestry Church, and Dena Nicolai, a community chaplain and refugee support mobilizer with the Christian Reformed Church in partnership with Immigrant

Services Society of B.C – Both Jennifer and Dena are experienced in reconciliation and dialogue initiatives between Israelis and Palestinians. The seminar attracted students and faculty from war-torn Muslim countries in the Middle East, with comments and questions relating to their desire to follow up with references to support groups for people affected by traumatic events in their countries of origin.

Events at KPU Richmond were brought to a close amid the sounds of an Indonesian gamelan performance by Sutrisno Hartana, a master of Javanese gamelan music, dance, and shadow puppets, and KPU student Lulu Sukaawati.
