2017 Theme - Reach Out

Since 2013, the Toronto Steering Committee for World Interfaith Harmony Week has been selecting annual themes that fulfill our Vision, Mission and Values.

Vision – We are committed to creating a world characterized by peace, social justice and a sustainable environment by cooperating with efforts around the world to bring about interfaith cooperation and intercultural dialogue.
Mission – To create and widen awareness of World Interfaith Harmony Week within the GTA, and to help plan, conceptualize, facilitate and coordinate its events.
Values – We respect all faiths and beliefs and peoples of goodwill, and believe there is great value in knowing each other and working together.

Canadians were shocked by the attack on worshippers at the <u>Centre Culturel Islamique de</u> <u>Québec</u> on January 29th. While expressing our grief and offering support to the Muslim community, we also recognized just how important it is to *Reach Out* to each other. Diverse groups across the City accepted our invitation to learn, share and collaborate while bringing together people of faith and goodwill.

For the 5th year in a row, The City of Toronto officially recognized World Interfaith Harmony Week. Mayor John Tory stated that "Toronto respects and accepts all religions, faiths and beliefs that make up our diverse communities".

Wednesday, February 1

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New Song, Reach Out, is Launched No Fixed Address, the St. Philips Lutheran Church House Band from Etobicoke, launched an original song and video entitled Reach

Out. Lyrics from the song include "It's a movement, come along, voices growing stronger, working hard to make us one. We'll grow on common ground..." With musical contributions from Halifax, Nova Scotia and St. Petersburg, Florida, the song became an international collaboration.



Sacred Fire Ritual – A Multifaith Program Many religions and faith traditions use fire as an integral part of their rituals. Four faith traditions – Aboriginal/First Nations, Hindu (Sanatan Dharma), Wiccan and Zoroastrian shared aspects of their Sacred Fire ceremonies with guests at the University of Toronto's Multi-Faith Centre. One of the themes that emerged during the evening was the importance of teaching these rituals from one generation to the next.





Culture and Religion Intertwined: How do we Stay True to Ourselves?

An "experts" panel explored *How do Culture and Religion influence and interact with each other (with respect to the Jewish, Catholic and Islamic faith tradtions)?* A "young adult" panel examined *How do we share the joys and overcome the challenges that arise from the*

influences and interactions between culture and religion? How do we continue to live out our faiths to the fullest, be ourselves, and grow as persons of faith?

In <u>Salt+Light Media's article</u>, Sebastian Gomes reported "A major point of emphasis in the discussion was the positive and unique pluralist reality that exists in Canada. Because of its size relative to its tiny population, its history of complementarity between French and English cultures, its openness to immigrants, and its geographic location, Nasir called it "one of the last outposts of real multiculturalism in the world.""

Standing in Solidarity with the Canadian Muslim Community



In response to the attack on worshippers at the <u>Centre Culturel Islamique de Québec</u> on January 29th, faith communities came together to stand in solidarity with our Canadian Muslim community. Several vigils were held during World Interfaith Harmony Week demonstrating that we stand shoulder to shoulder with the Muslim community against extremism. 
Sunday, February 5: A Gathering in Solidarity with the Muslim Community
