## Interfaith Dialogue hosted by Ecopeace Teen Cafe as part of United Nations World Interfaith Harmony Week on February 1, 2023

Ecopeace Teen Cafe is an online dialogue platform working with the vision to create a safe and inclusive space for all and equip them to take action for a peaceful, just and sustainable world. Ecopeace Teen Cafe works under the leadership of Greshma Pious Raju, hosted an online interfaith dialogue with religious leaders from different parts of the world on the auspicious occasion of celebrating World Interfaith Harmony Week on February 1, 2023, from 8 PM to 9:30 PM Indian Standard Time.
