The event was an interfaith panel discussion on the topic of **"Faith: Tool or Weapon? Hate and Discrimination."** There were three panelists representing Christian, Islamic, and Jewish traditions.





It was a lively, thoughtful and very engaging dialogue between speakers and participants. There were back and forth discussions both on facebook and zoom. Questions were answered as they arose in the discussion and at the end there was invitation for participants to ask further questions and or provide feedback.





During the event, NMCLC presented two annual awards for interfaith relations excellence. The 2022 recipients were two prominent interfaith leaders and activists in Toronto - Mr. Muneeb Nasir and Ms. Shirley Tetreau.
