OVERVIEW

Planning for the UNWIHW 2024 began in August of the previous year. We set up a Coordinating Committee and subcommittees for each of the particular events. The committees are populated with representatives from different faiths so that in our working together we are accomplishing the very goal of UNWIHW.

This year we had some exciting new evolutions. We were pleased and grateful for the participation of children performing a reader's theatre of the Zen parable Stone Soup in our opening ceremony at City Hall. This was appreciated and valued by everybody who attended, including Mayor of Calgary Jyoti Gondek. Also included in the opening ceremony was a short video with diverse reflections on the application of the Stone Soup story to interfaith work.

We used large helium-filled balloon letters, UNWIHW, as a place for taking pictures, playing and celebrating with each other. These balloons were enjoyed at many events, as the photographs included in this report demonstrate.

The CIC worked with new partners this year, particularly the University of Calgary and students both for an event around Scriptural Reasoning and a lecture at Calgary's Main Public Library.

We also created an opportunity for people from different faiths to volunteer together supporting a local Salvation Army homeless shelter. Seven women from diverse faiths -Bahai, Buddhist, Christian, Indigenous, Jewish Muslim and Sikh - talked about female leaders from their faith traditions at an event celebrating women of faith. This was inspiring and empowering for the men and women who attended.

A few events have become standbys. The Interfaith Potluck is always a wonderful opportunity to gather around diverse food and to have conversations about what our faiths have in common and in what ways they are unique. This event always leaves people feeling connected and with greater understanding. The Interfaith concert, including a children's Interfaith choir. is a great place for people to hear and participate in songs of peace. As you can see, our events happened throughout Calgary and were well attended.

A further new development for 2024 was a more thorough social media campaign. We posted all of our events on Facebook and Instagram as well as through e-news communications with our email lists, and on YouTube and our website.
