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#### Message from the Co-Chairs

Our theme this year was Together at the Table.

We created a new website and expanded our electronic outreach.

We found partnership in our cause from several groups. People of goodwill from 19 faith communities joined us to stand up and declare for interfaith harmony.

Places of worship opened their doors to the general public and we had more than 125 people attend services and spiritual celebrations with our Sacred Spaces program.

Our Interfaith Engagement Program guided 7 people to explore the ways of their neighbours.

In addition, we sponsored a panel discussion of the importance of food in different traditions, highlighting speakers from 4 different spiritual traditions and welcomed guests and participants to join in the conversation.

We concluded the week with a common celebration of a joyous sharing of music, dance, art and more, from multiple partners, hosting more than 320 people to celebrate with us from a variety of traditions in our Halifax community.

World Interfaith Harmony Week takes place against a backdrop of a world in disarray. This is the context in which we set out to create our celebration of harmony, and we bring a message of hope.

We are grateful for the opportunity to engage in this powerful sharing of life and wisdom with each other. The experience of coming to know each other is surely a cure for the ills of the world that we create in our separation.

Thanks to our strong organizational team and the many sacred spaces who have joined us to make this week possible.

#### **Report from IHH Sacred Spaces Committee for Feb. 2024**

There were a total of 19 Sacred Spaces participating in various ways in Halifax Nova Scotia for World Interfaith Harmony Week 2024.

Most faith communities, if not all, welcome visitors at any time of the year but during World Interfaith Harmony Week specific communities welcome those visiting by mentioning that it is World Interfaith Harmony Week, and Interfaith Harmony Halifax advertises/promotes visits to those specific communities.

This year three Jewish communities-Conservative, Orthodox, Reform participated, one with an inperson service, one with online service only, and one both in-person and online. Two Muslim groups, one Shia and one Sunni, held in-person meetings, as did Sikh, Hindu, Quaker, Buddhist, and Baha'i groups, and New Horizons Baptist Church. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints and the local Brahma Kumaris society held online meetings only. The Atlantic School of Theology held their service both in-person and online, as did the Earth Spirit Society of Nova Scotia. There was representation from the Mennonites, in an Interfaith Conversation on Faith & Food at the Halifax Central Library and at the closing Celebratory event, three additional groups participated: Elder Deb Eisan from the Mi'kmaw Native Friendship Centre, the Fung Koy Lok Taoist Society, and St. David's Presbyterian Church Choir.

Numbers of visitors varied depending on the day, the weather, health, and if the event was in person, online or both. Due to inclement weather, a number of events were rescheduled and this affected attendance. We are looking at ways to circumvent this issue in the future as February weather is often unkind. Since COVID there are many who are still nervous meeting in close quarters. The theme this year was Together at the Table and I would say there were several common ideals among all groups: the importance of seeking and showing love, light, peace and unity, and of sharing our food and hospitality with others.

# Interfaith Engagement Program

#### What is it?

Before IHH begins, IEP participants will meet for an introductory session where you will get to know one another and prepare for the Sacred Spaces events. During the week the IEP provides you with a cohort of fellow attenders. At the conclusion of IHH Week, we gather again for a Closing Session to share our experiences and reflections.

#### Why participate?

The IEP offers the opportunity to develop a deeper sense of community among those who attend IHH's events. It is both educational & fun and offers the possibility to get to know people who you might not otherwise meet.

Interfaith Engagement Program report

Thirteen people registered for the Interfaith Engagement Program 2024 - 4 returning and 9 first-time participants. Including co-facilitators, Robyn and Jocelyne, 9 people took part in the Introductory Session. It was decided early on that the IEP would take place in person and not online. The intimacy of the in-person session was appreciated by participants. This year the IEP was hosted in the Dalhousie University Multifaith Services space on Dal's campus, which worked very well. In addition, DMS provided Student Assistant support as our IEP registrar. DMS SA Dhruvi Shah developed the registration portal and assisted us with communication.

The IEP was hindered by the delay in confirming Sacred Spaces and Events. We really didn't get going until January while promotion for the IEP has to go out as early as October in order to attract attention. Having a confirmed list of IHH events is the 'thing' that draws interest. We will attend to this issue for future celebrations.

It gave an opportunity for political leadership at all levels of government to support and welcome all of our communities.






