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FINAL REPORT ON THE WEEK OF SCIENTIFIC, CULTURAL, EDUCATIONAL, AND SPORTS EVENTS IN CELEBRATION OF WORLD INTERFAITH HARMONY WEEK 2025

Abstract

The UNESCO Chair in Comparative Study of World Religions at the International Islamic Academy of Uzbekistan (IIAU) organized a Week of Scientific, Cultural, Educational, and Sports Events from February 4 to 8, 2025, in observance of World Interfaith Harmony Week, as mandated by United Nations General Assembly Resolution A/RES/65/5. The initiative, held under the theme "Human Fraternity and Interfaith Dialogue – A Factor of International Solidarity," aimed to promote interfaith dialogue, cultural exchange, and social cohesion through a multidisciplinary approach.

The week-long program integrated scientific discourse, cultural exhibitions, educational engagements, competitive activities, and experiential learning to explore mechanisms for strengthening interfaith understanding and global solidarity. The events were designed to engage academics, religious leaders, students, and the wider community, fostering intellectual exchange and practical experiences that highlight Uzbekistan's historical and contemporary commitment to religious tolerance. The initiative also reinforced Uzbekistan's role as a regional leader in interfaith dialogue, aligning with global peace-building objectives.

This report provides an **overall assessment of the initiative's impact**, followed by a **detailed analysis of each event separately**. Each section examines the **objectives**, **participants**, **format**, **execution**, **and outcomes** of the events, including:

- > International Scientific-Practical Seminar A high-level academic discussion on interfaith dialogue and international solidarity.

- > Student Scientific and Practical Conference Encouraging academic discourse on tolerance within religious doctrines.
- > **Interfaith Friendship Journey** Experiential learning through guided visits to religious sites.
- > Creative Competition Youth-driven multimedia exploration of faith and unity.
- > **Interfaith Solidarity Games** Sports as a medium for interfaith cooperation and friendship.

By analyzing **each event separately**, this report identifies **successes**, **challenges**, **and opportunities for future improvement**, offering **data-driven insights** into the effectiveness of interdisciplinary approaches in advancing interfaith harmony. The findings confirm that a **combination of intellectual**, **cultural**, **and physical activities** significantly enhances interfaith dialogue and cooperation. Furthermore, the outcomes emphasize the **scalability and sustainability** of such programs, positioning Uzbekistan as **a replicable model for religious coexistence**. The report concludes with **recommendations for future initiatives**, ensuring continued progress in fostering global interfaith solidarity.

Introduction

The UNESCO Chair in Comparative Study of World Religions at the International Islamic Academy of Uzbekistan (IIAU) organized and executed a series of interdisciplinary events from February 4 to 8, 2025, in observance of World Interfaith Harmony Week, as mandated by United Nations General Assembly Resolution A/RES/65/5. Under the thematic framework "Human Fraternity and Interfaith Dialogue – A Factor of International Solidarity," the initiative integrated scientific discourse, cultural exhibitions, educational engagements, competitive activities, and experiential learning to promote interfaith understanding and social cohesion. This report evaluates the methodology, outcomes, and implications of these efforts, situating them within the broader context of Uzbekistan's socio-religious heritage and global peace-building objectives.

World Interfaith Harmony Week 2025 provided a platform to investigate and enhance the mechanisms of interfaith dialogue and human fraternity. Hosted by the UNESCO Chair, the program aimed to: (1) facilitate intellectual exchange among diverse stakeholders, (2) showcase cultural and historical exemplars of tolerance, (3) engage youth in constructive activities, and (4) reinforce Uzbekistan's role as a model of interreligious harmony. The following sections detail the events, analyze their impact, and propose future directions.

Methodology and Event Overview:

- 1. International Scientific-Practical Seminar (February 4, 2025)
 - > **Objective:** To examine the role of interfaith dialogue in fostering international solidarity.
 - > **Participants:** UNESCO representatives, religious scholars, and interdisciplinary experts.
 - > **Format:** Presentations and panel discussions.
 - **Execution:** this seminar established a theoretical framework for subsequent activities, emphasizing empirical and philosophical perspectives.

2. Cultural Performances – "Voices of Culture: Celebrating Diversity in Unity" (February 4, 2025)

- > **Objective:** To demonstrate Uzbekistan's multicultural heritage.
- > **Participants:** Representatives from Uygur, Turkmen, and Bashkir cultural centers.
- **Format:** Musical performances.
- **Execution:** Staged at IIAU, this event utilized artistic expression to reinforce cultural interconnectedness.

3. Theatrical Performances (February 4, 2025)

- > **Objective:** To narrate historical instances of compassion and tolerance.
- **Participants:** IIAU student theater group.
- > **Format:** "You Are Not Orphaned" based on a documented World War II case study of Shomahmud Shoahmedov and Baxri Akramova adopting 14 orphans.
- > **Execution:** Performed at IIAU, these productions provided a qualitative exploration of solidarity.

4. Interfaith "Unity and Friendship Table" (February 4, 2025)

- > **Objective:** To promote informal interfaith interaction.
- > **Participants:** Leaders from multiple religious communities.
- > Format: Shared meal with unstructured dialogue.
- > **Execution:** Hosted at IIAU, this event leveraged social bonding to enhance mutual understanding.

5. Student Scientific and Practical Conference (February 5, 2025)

- > **Objective:** To investigate tolerance within religious doctrines.
- > **Participants:** Students from IIAU, Imam Bukhari Tashkent Islamic Institute, and Tashkent Orthodox Seminary.
- > **Format:** Paper presentations and discussions.
- **Execution:** Held at IIAU, this conference facilitated peer-to-peer academic exchange.

6. Interfaith Friendship Journey (February 6, 2025)

- > **Objective:** To provide experiential learning of religious diversity.
- > **Participants:** IIAU students.
- > **Format:** Guided visits to religious sites (e.g., Russian Orthodox Church, Roman Catholic Church) with discussions.

Execution: Conducted in Tashkent, this activity offered direct exposure to interfaith practices.

7. Creative Competition: "Faith and Unity – The Foundation of Human Fraternity" (February 8, 2025)

- > **Objective:** To evaluate youth perspectives on unity via multimedia.
- > **Participants:** Uzbek youth.
- **Format:** Social video submissions with an awarding ceremony.
- **Execution:** Hosted at IIAU, this competition quantified creative engagement.

8. Interfaith Solidarity Games (February 8, 2025)

- > **Objective:** To assess interfaith collaboration through physical activity.
- > **Participants:** Students from IIAU, Tashkent Islamic Institute, and Tashkent Orthodox Seminary.
- > **Format:** Competitions in chess, table tennis, and football, followed by a closing cérémonie.
- **Execution:** Held at IIAU, this event measured social integration through sport.

On February 4, 2025, the UNESCO Chair in Comparative Study of World Religions at the International Islamic Academy of Uzbekistan (IIAU) hosted the International Scientific-Practical Seminar titled "Human Fraternity and Interfaith Dialogue – A Factor of International Solidarity." This seminar marked the first event of a week-long series dedicated to World Interfaith Harmony Week, held in Uzbekistan for the first time. The event convened prominent scholars, religious leaders, and representatives from international organizations to discuss the essential role of interfaith dialogue in fostering global peace and solidarity.

The seminar was moderated by **Zohidjon Islamov**, Vice-Rector of the IIAU, whose leadership ensured that the discussions aligned with the academy's educational mission. The event commenced with welcome remarks from **Matluba Kakharova**, Deputy Chairman of the Committee on Religious Affairs of Uzbekistan, highlighting governmental support for interfaith initiatives. **Dilnoza Kurbanaova**, Chief Expert of the National Commission of Uzbekistan for UNESCO, reinforced the event's international significance and UNESCO's active involvement.

The seminar assembled a distinguished panel of **religious leaders and scholars**, representing **various faith traditions** and ensuring an **inclusive**, **balanced**, **and indepth exploration of interfaith harmony**. Their contributions provided unique insights into the role of religious communities in fostering peace, mutual respect, and international solidarity.

Homidjon Ishmatbekov, Deputy Chairman of the Muslim Board of Uzbekistan, highlighted the foundational Islamic principles of peace, tolerance, and social cohesion. He underscored Islam's emphasis on harmonious coexistence with diverse religious communities and stressed the responsibility of religious leaders in promoting ethical values and mutual understanding. His address reinforced the majority Muslim community's engagement in interfaith initiatives and their commitment to strengthening unity within Uzbek society.

Sergiy Stasenko, Vice-Rector of the Tashkent Orthodox Seminary and Archpriest, provided an Orthodox Christian perspective, emphasizing the importance of religious dialogue in bridging historical divides. He spoke about the Orthodox Church's contributions to **interfaith cooperation and its role in upholding moral and spiritual values** in an increasingly globalized world. His remarks reinforced the need for collaboration between different faith traditions to address contemporary challenges.

Yeji Matsulevich, Head of the Roman Catholic Center in Uzbekistan and Bishop, broadened the discussion by offering insights into the Catholic Church's longstanding efforts in interreligious dialogue. He emphasized the importance of fraternity, compassion, and humanitarian cooperation, highlighting the Catholic Church's global initiatives in fostering mutual respect and social solidarity. His remarks served to strengthen the seminar's message of unity and peaceful coexistence.

Arkadiy Isakharov, Chairman of the Jewish Religious Community of Tashkent, contributed valuable perspectives on the historical and contemporary presence of Jewish communities in Uzbekistan. He spoke about the rich legacy of Jewish-Muslim-Christian relations in Central Asia and **emphasized the need for continued interfaith initiatives to preserve and nurture these ties**. His remarks reinforced the **importance of inclusivity in religious discourse and community engagement**.

Sergey Terentyev, President of the Bible Society of Uzbekistan, addressed the role of sacred texts in fostering interreligious dialogue. He highlighted how scriptural teachings across different faith traditions **emphasize love**, **respect**, **and understanding**, **serving as a basis for constructive engagement**. His contribution underlined the role of interdenominational collaboration in promoting dialogue and spiritual enrichment across religious communities.

Odiljon Ernazarov, Head of the Chair at the International Islamic Academy of Uzbekistan, provided an academic perspective on interfaith dialogue. He emphasized the necessity of integrating religious studies into educational frameworks to promote interreligious understanding among future generations. His remarks highlighted the significance of scholarly research in shaping informed and respectful interfaith discourse.

The seminar centered on several critical themes, including:

- > The necessity of interfaith dialogue in addressing contemporary global challenges and fostering peaceful societies.
- > The role of religious teachings in promoting tolerance, mutual respect, and human fraternity.
- > The contribution of educational institutions in nurturing future generations of interfaith scholars and practitioners.
- > The impact of international collaboration, particularly through UNESCO's initiatives, in advancing religious and cultural understanding.

As the first event of its kind in Uzbekistan dedicated to World Interfaith Harmony Week, this seminar set a significant precedent for future initiatives in interfaith dialogue. It reinforced Uzbekistan's role as a hub for religious tolerance and cooperation, encouraging continued collaboration between governmental, academic, and religious institutions. The discussions and recommendations from the seminar will serve as a foundation for further research and policy development in interfaith engagement.

The International Scientific-Practical Seminar "Human Fraternity and Interfaith Dialogue — A Factor of International Solidarity" successfully launched a transformative week of events aimed at strengthening interfaith harmony. By bringing together diverse religious and academic voices, it underscored the importance of dialogue, education, and international cooperation in building a more tolerant and united world. Impact and Outcomes

The Week of Scientific, Cultural, Educational, and Sports Events, held from February 4 to 8, 2025, at the International Islamic Academy of Uzbekistan (IIAU), marked a significant milestone in advancing interfaith harmony under the auspices of the UNESCO Chair in Comparative Study of World Religions. This section evaluates the initiative's impact through participation statistics, qualitative feedback, contributions to interfaith dialogue and global solidarity, and Uzbekistan's reinforced position as a model for religious coexistence.

Participation Statistics and Feedback

The week-long program engaged a diverse audience of **over 1,000 participants**, encompassing **religious leaders**, **scholars**, **students**, **cultural representatives**, **and community members from various ethnic and faith backgrounds**. The events drew attendees from institutions such as the **IIAU**, **Imam Bukhari Tashkent Islamic Institute**, **Tashkent Orthodox Seminary**, **and international bodies like UNESCO**, **reflecting a broad demographic reach**. Specific participation highlights include:

- > International Scientific-Practical Seminar: Over 50 attendees, including prominent religious and academic figures.
- > Cultural and Theatrical Performances: Over 200 participants each, with significant student involvement.

- > Student Scientific and Practical Conference: Over 50 students and scholars, emphasizing youth academic participation.
- > **Interfaith Friendship Journey**: Over **30 participants**, offering experiential learning.
- > Creative Competition: Over 100 participants, showcasing youth creativity.
- > Interfaith Solidarity Games: A diverse student cohort from multiple institutions, with exact numbers contributing to the overall 1,000+ total.

Feedback collected through informal surveys and post-event testimonials underscored the initiative's success. Approximately 70% of participants in the Student Conference and Creative Competition reported an enhanced understanding of tolerance and interfaith principles, according to an informal survey cited in the report. Additionally, 85% of participants in the Friendship Journey and Solidarity Games noted positive interfaith interactions, as per post-event feedback. Testimonies such as Arkadiy Isakharov's reflection on the theatrical performance ("This performance was not just a play; it was a lesson in humanity") and Sunnatullo Rahmonov's comment on youth inspiration ("It inspired me to reflect on how we can contribute to a more inclusive world") highlight the emotional and intellectual resonance of the events.

Contributions to Interfaith Dialogue and Global Solidarity

The initiative significantly advanced interfaith dialogue by integrating intellectual, cultural, and physical modalities, aligning with the thematic framework "Human Fraternity and Interfaith Dialogue – A Factor of International Solidarity." The International Scientific-Practical Seminar laid a theoretical foundation, with discussions on religious teachings' role in promoting tolerance and educational institutions' contributions to interfaith understanding. Contributions from diverse panelists – representing Islam, Orthodox Christianity, Roman Catholicism, Judaism, and interdenominational perspectives – enriched the discourse, fostering a multidimensional exploration of global solidarity.

Cultural events, such as "Voices of Culture" and the theatrical performance "You Are Not Orphaned," reinforced this dialogue through artistic expression, illustrating Uzbekistan's multicultural heritage and historical narratives of compassion. The "Unity and Friendship Table" and Interfaith Friendship Journey provided practical platforms for informal and experiential interfaith engagement, breaking down barriers through shared meals and site visits. Meanwhile, the Student Conference and Creative Competition empowered youth to contribute fresh perspectives, with 70% reporting increased awareness of tolerance—a testament to the initiative's educational impact.

The Interfaith Solidarity Games epitomized physical collaboration, demonstrating sports as a universal language that transcends religious divides. Structured dialogues during the Games, focusing on teamwork and unity, further solidified interfaith bonds, with participants noting lasting connections formed through shared experiences. Collectively, these events operationalized the UN Resolution A/RES/65/5's principles of "Love of God and Love of Neighbor," contributing to global solidarity by showcasing scalable strategies for interreligious cooperation.

Uzbekistan's Role as a Model for Religious Coexistence

Uzbekistan's socio-historical context—marked by its multiethnic composition and legacy of wartime solidarity, as exemplified in "You Are Not Orphaned"—served as a robust foundation for this initiative. The events highlighted the nation's contemporary commitment to religious tolerance, positioning it as a replicable model for interreligious coexistence. The participation of representatives from the Muslim Board, Orthodox Church, Catholic Center, Jewish Community, and Bible Society underscored Uzbekistan's inclusivity, reflecting its historical role as a cultural and religious crossroads in Central Asia.

The initiative's alignment with UNESCO's global objectives reinforced Uzbekistan's leadership **in regional interfaith dialogue**. The high participation rate—over **1,000 individuals across diverse demographics**—and positive feedback (e.g., **85% reporting positive interactions**) suggest the program's scalability and sustainability. Strategic use of multimedia platforms and hashtags (#UNESCOChair, #InterfaithDialogue, etc.) amplified its global reach, enhancing transparency and accessibility. By integrating academic rigor, cultural resonance,

and kinesthetic engagement, Uzbekistan demonstrated a holistic approach to peace-building, offering a blueprint for other nations to emulate.

The initiative's success reaffirms Uzbekistan's proactive stance, supported by governmental bodies like the Committee on Religious Affairs and the Committee on Interethnic Relations, as well as academic and religious stakeholders. This collaborative framework not only strengthened national cohesion but also contributed to the global discourse on interfaith harmony, positioning Uzbekistan as a beacon of religious coexistence in an increasingly polarized world.

Conclusion and Future Prospects

UNESCO's global peace-building objectives and **positioning Uzbekistan** as a regional hub for interfaith dialogue.

The collaboration among governmental bodies (e.g., Committee on Religious Affairs), academic institutions, and religious communities exemplified a unified commitment to religious harmony, contributing to both **national cohesion and international discourse**. The initiative's holistic methodology enriched participant experiences, **fostering empathy**, **mutual respect**, and **long-term retention of interfaith principles**.

In conclusion, the Week of Scientific, Cultural, Educational, and Sports Events 2025 marked a historic milestone as the first officially organized World Interfaith Harmony Week celebration in Uzbekistan by the UNESCO Chair in Comparative Study of World Religions. This pioneering initiative introduced a comprehensive and innovative approach to interfaith engagement, significantly contributing to global solidarity, religious tolerance, and a culture of peace. The successful execution of these events underscores the UNESCO Chair's leadership and Uzbekistan's proactive commitment to fostering interreligious dialogue.

Building on this success, the UNESCO Chair, in collaboration with national and international partners, **plans to continue organizing this event annually**, expanding its scope and impact. Future editions will further enhance **intellectual discourse**, **cultural exchange**, **and interfaith collaboration**, ensuring that the principles of **human fraternity and mutual understanding** continue to strengthen both within Uzbekistan and across the world.
