In 2017, the inaugural year of the Calgary Interfaith Council, we participated in the United Nations World Interfaith Harmony week, submitted an event report and were amazed and grateful to receive First Prize. This was a significant support to us as we were emerging as an organization.

Since 2017, we have celebrated UNWIHW every February, including online events during the pandemic. Our participation in this opportunity has become a signature activity for the Calgary Interfaith Council and is one of the ways we actualize our mission:

- deepening relationships across faith traditions

- learning from and about each other

In this report we will share an overview, brief summaries of the eleven events hosted during UNWIHW, photos, videos and media coverage.

Overview

Planning for the UNWIHW 2025 began in August of the previous year. We set up a Coordinating Committee and subcommittees for each of the particular events. The committees are populated with representatives from different faiths so that in our working together we are accomplishing the very goal of UNWIHW.

This year we had some exciting new evolutions. We hosted 8 Faithful Days Midday prayers for a World United. Prayers were hosted by different faiths. We engaged directly with the issue of racism, Anti racism through the Lens of Faith as that is an experience shared by and occurring in different faith communities. Within the framework of UNWIHW we took the opportunity to do some member engagement work and reflect on the work we are doing and how we can improve, Interfaith in Action. Finally we made a direct effort to reach out to people under 35 years of age to encourage them to become involved in interfaith work with the Big Mingle.

A few events have become standbys. The Interfaith Potluck is always a wonderful opportunity to gather around diverse food and to have conversations about what our faiths have in common and in what ways they are unique. This event always leaves people feeling connected and with greater understanding. The Spoken Word and Choral Concert was particularly dynamic this year, with a visiting Congolese drummer and musician.

We continued to use social media to promote our events. We posted all of our events on Facebook and Instagram as well as through e-news communications with our email lists.

We had participation from: children, young adults and adults; clergy and lay people; Indigenous and non indigenous. Participants were invited to a ritual of welcome combining the Namaste hand gesture with intentions of welcome and kindness from different traditions.

We used an interview matrix process to check out what we are doing well and what our members want to do more of. The results of this work are already informing our efforts to make CIC more helpful to the community in building bridges of understanding and mutual support.
